Braeden Caley has devoted more than twenty years to getting big things done for British Columbians and all Canadians, in government and public policy.

Most recently, he served as Deputy Chief of Staff to Prime Minister Mark Carney — standing strong to protect workers and businesses from unjust tariffs, and building Canada’s economy strong with a plan to bring down costs, help Canada ‘Buy Canadian’ again, and build new homes and major projects, faster.

At this decisive moment for Canada, Braeden is running to be part of Mark Carney’s team delivering on our priorities right here in North Vancouver–Capilano: a port that can double our non-U.S. exports and reach new trading partners, new ships built for our Navy and Coast Guard, and affordable homes and infrastructure for a growing North Shore. That includes the new Canada–B.C. Cooperative Prosperity Agreement to unlock a stronger and more sustainable B.C. economy.

Braeden’s service began in the constituency offices of two B.C. Members of Parliament. He spent six years there helping people find housing, secure the benefits they’d earned, and be better heard in Ottawa — and it taught him that a strong country is served one person, one problem, and one promise kept at a time. That work grew into two decades advising leaders — as Director of Policy and Communications to the Mayor at Vancouver City Hall, as President & CEO of Canada 2020, Canada’s leading independent progressive think tank, and in senior campaign roles, including in national leadership of the historic 2025 campaign that elected Mark Carney as Prime Minister.

Braeden is a born-and-raised British Columbian who learned the importance of hard work from a mother and grandmother who were both teachers, and a father who fueled aircraft, drove BC Transit buses, and served in our Armed Forces. He earned a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science from the University of British Columbia and an Executive Certificate in Public Policy from Harvard’s Kennedy School of Government. In 2016, he was named one of BC Business’s “Top 30 Under 30.”
